Once again our fantastic Ms Tonya and Ms Liz have put together a special week for our students during Spring Break. (see more information on page 6)





Anna Ogilvy was a budding twenty-five-year-old writer with a bright future. Then, one night, she stabbed two people to death with no apparent motive—and hasn't woken up since. Dubbed "Sleeping Beauty" by the tabloids, Anna's condition is a rare psychosomatic disorder known to neurologists as "resignation syndrome."



Dr. Benedict Prince is a forensic psychologist and an expert in the field of sleep-related homicides. His methods are the last hope of solving the infamous "Anna O" case and waking Anna up so she can stand trial. But he must be careful treating such a high-profile suspect—he's got career secrets and a complicated personal life of his own.

As Anna shows the first signs of stirring, Benedict must determine what really happened and whether Anna should be held responsible for her crimes. Only Anna knows the truth about that night, but only Benedict knows how to discover it. And they're both in danger from what they find out.

Anna O is Matthew Blake's outstanding debut novel. It is a roller-coaster ride of suspense and ends with a shocking reveal. The novel is well researched and easy to read. Just when I would think I had the killer figured out, the story would go in a totally different direction. The ending was a complete surprise to me. Kudos to the author for making me enjoy a murder mystery. As I walk away from this novel, I can't help but wonder what kind of crazy, virtuoso-like mind came up with this plot. Detailed and utterly awe-inspiring, it seriously reminded me of The Silent Patient in all of its mind-blowing intensity. Was it just a bit too long and perhaps somewhat overly convoluted? Yes, maybe a tad. All in all, however, I highly recommend giving this book a shot despite its early mixed reviews.






#### 50 Brilliant Minds in the Last 100 Years: Identifying the Mystery of Genius by Rodney Castleden

Did you notice the full moon last week? Some of my favorite times was running the yard on moon-lit nights with my girls. Armed with glow sticks and flash lights, we'd play team tag hiding behind trees and running outside circling the house to get to home base and be safe. This book has been a long-time favorite of mine, and I recently shared it with a kindergartener. We studied the watercolor illustrations as I summarized most of the story. I only read a few excerpts from the book because I knew the 32 pages might prove to be too long after a day of school. He loved examining the illustrations though and noticed every detail of the snow-covered ground, woods and animals.

With this book review, I want to encourage parents to include longer books with your young readers. Take the liberty of skipping pages, only studying the illustrations and even telling your own story to go with them. Reread your favorites over the years, reading more of the text. You'll find before you know it, they'll be able to read the book by heart, and I'm going to predict it might be one of their favorites that they share with their own children.

## Bookmarked—Jolaine Konstantinidis

Women of the Post by Joshundra Sanders reveals a part of WWII history of which I was previously uninformed. Under the command of Captain Charity Adams, a group of over 800 Black women enlisted in the Women's Army Corps (WAC) were stationed in Europe to sort mountains of undeliverable mail. Distributing the mail to the enlisted men fighting abroad was considered imperative to boost morale. So, the 6888 (Six Triple Eight) as they came to be known took as their mantra, "No mail, no morale." Despite the fact that these women, "Negroes" or "Coloreds" as they were named at the time, surpassed all expectations in dedication and determination to serve their country proudly, they would not be properly recognized for some 60 years later and then only within the military rather than the general public.



Women of the Post, a work of historical fiction, elucidates a part of history that might have been lost altogether due to racism. The reality of segregation laws among civilians and military, the effects of the Jim Crow era and actions of the KuKlux Klan is portrayed vividly in the novel that the author spent years researching through the national archives and recorded interviews with live witnesses and family members of the 6888. Sanders writes an extensive afterword that details the facts as presented in her novel as well as the liberties she took fictionalizing with respect to the feelings these brave women may have experienced due to the physical and emotional risks they took as well as oppression of their race.

This novel pays honor to the "Six Double Eight" whose tribute is long overdue. Scarlett Dragna has never left the tiny island where she and her sister, Tella, live with their powerful, and cruel, father. Now Scarlett's father has arranged a marriage for her, and Scarlett thinks her dreams of seeing Caraval—the faraway, once-a-year performance where the audience participates in the show—are over.

But this year, Scarlett's long-dreamt-of invitation finally arrives. With the help of a mysterious sailor, Tella whisks Scarlett away to the show. Only, as soon as they arrive, Tella is kidnapped by Caraval's mastermind organizer, Legend. It turns out that this season's Caraval revolves around Tella, and whoever finds her first is the winner.

Scarlett has been told that everything that happens during Caraval is only an elaborate performance. Nevertheless she becomes enmeshed in a game of love, heartbreak, and magic. And whether Caraval is real or not, Scarlett must find Tella before the five nights of the game are over or a dangerous domino effect of consequences will be set off, and her beloved sister will disappear forever.

A whimsical story with great world building and an interesting plot.

Every time a place in the book would be described I would think "huh, this reminds me a lot of Alice and Wonderland." I looked it up and although she loves Alice and Wonderland, **Stephanie Garber's** biggest inspirations for *Caraval* were Baz Luhrmann films and the band Florence + The Machine, which actually makes a lot of sense, but it definitely shares some similarities with an Alice-like world.

This book was so magical yet had a hint of something sinister going on in the shadows the whole time. It was filled with twists and turns and had such a big plot twist that I didn't see coming in the slightest. If you're a fan of magic and a bit of mystery, I would recommend this book for you.
